

# Campus Map Key

## Building

1. Conference Center – Houses the Dining Hall, as well as offices for Campus Police and Food Service.
2. Walter Starr Hall – Built in 1923, houses Christian Ministry program students.
3. Lucy Peters Hall – Built in 1922. Building has a meeting room, classroom, and office areas.
4. Poloke-Bosen Hall – Built in 1923. Home to Native American programs.
5. Kiva Lodge: Home of Alumni Offices and Native American Student Organizations.
6. Alexander Posey Hall – Men’s residence hall.
7. A, B, & C Dorms - Residential halls built in 2001.
8. Old Warrior Gym – Moved to campus in 1948. Formally a NCO Club at Camp Gruber. Gym Annex – Built in 1968. Houses weightroom and Athletic Department offices.
9. Benjamin Wacoche Hall – Built in 1924. Serves as a meeting hall.
10. McCombs Hall – Built in 1938. Houses the Art Department. Famous art students such as Acee Blue Eagle, Dick West, Woody Crumbo, Terry Saul, Ruthe Blalock Jones, and others were taught here.
11. C.C. Harmon Nursing Facility – Opened in 1976. Houses the Health Science programs.
12. Issac McCoy Hall – Built in 1937. Serves as a female residence hall.
13. Barnett Hall – Built in 1923. Once a dormitory, now houses faculty for Arts & Sciences, Business, General Studies, and School of Education departments.
14. Bacone Memorial Chapel – Originally built in 1941. Rebuilt in 1992 after being destroyed by fire. Serves as the center of all religious life activities on campus.
15. The Palmer Center – Built in 1997. Houses the gymnasium, student lounge, snack bar, theater, and Student Support Services.
16. Samuel Richard Hall – Built in 1921. Serves as the main classroom building. Offices of the President, Executive Vice President, & Dean of Faculty, and Development Office.
17. Maintenance Department – The upkeep and repair hub of campus buildings and grounds.
18. Sally Journeycake Hall – Built in 1937. Formally a dormitory. Today houses the office of Human Resources, Business Office, and the Center for Christian Ministry.
19. Patrick Hurley House – Home of the College President.
20. Ataloo Lodge Museum – Opened in 1932 to serve as an art building. Today houses one of the largest privately owned collections of American Indian artifacts in the country.
21. Log House – Built in 1939 to teach the home economics classes. Today it is a faculty/ staff home.
22. Faculty Row – Faculty and Staff residences.
23. Virginia Palmer Student Life Center – Opened in 2012. Houses Student Life Offices, Weight Room, Housing, Bookstore, Printshop & Graphics, Future home of Dining Services, and Athletic Offices.
24. Merritt D. Betts Library & Robert Yaffe | Harry Leonard Welcome Center – Opened in 2012. Houses Division of Adult Education, Admissions, Financial Aid, Registrar.

## Memorials

- A. Salt Kettle – Was one of more than 100 formed as equipment of the Mackey Salt Works on the military road to Ft. Smith, Arkansas.
- B. Millie Francis Monument – In honor of a Creek Indian woman who after saving the life of a soldier in 1817 was awarded a Medal by Congress. She died in 1844 before receiving it.
- C. Alice Robertson Rock – Named for the second U.S. Congress member and Daughter of American Revolution activist from Muskogee. The rock was removed from her home, Sawoka, located on Agency Hill, here in Muskogee.
- D. Stone Bible – Etched with the names and dates of service of each of Bacone’s presidents.
- E. Bacone College Cemetery – Burial place of Almon C. Bacone, teachers, students, and other dignitaries.
- F. Company “I” Memorial – Created to honor Bacone Alumni who fought in five of our nation’s wars. The memorial was funded by WWII vets of Company I of the 45th Infantry.
- G. Original Bacone Baptistery – Completed in 1885. Still in use today.
- H. Chickasaw Warrior – Artwork of alumni, Enoch Kelly Haney, donated May of 2011.

## Sports/Recreation

- I. Warrior Baseball Park – Home of the Bacone Warrior Men’s Baseball team and the Lady Warrior’s Softball team.
- II. Basketball Courts – Available for Bacone Students’ use.
- III. Practice Fields – Football and Soccer
- IV. Rodeo Grounds – Built in 2008. Consists of arena and three stables.
- V. Volleyball Courts - Available for Bacone Students’ use.
